




Traffic changes at Ferny Avenue (Gold Coast Highway)

From Monday 4 November 2013, a southbound traffic lane will be re-opened along Ferny Avenue (Gold Coast Highway) from the intersection with Surfers Paradise Boulevard.

Major construction in the area will recommence following the Gold Coast 600 event.

Traffic changes:

- Ferny Avenue (Gold Coast Highway) will retain two lanes northbound.
- One southbound lane will be maintained on Ferny Avenue (Gold Coast Highway) from the intersection with Surfers Paradise Boulevard (see map).
- Surfers Paradise Boulevard will be closed from Ferny Avenue to Main Beach Parade.
- Traffic diverted to Ferny Avenue will be given priority right turn movements into Ocean Avenue, which remains one-way, to return to the Gold Coast Highway (see map).
- Temporary traffic signals at the intersection of Ferny Avenue and Main Beach Parade will be reinstalled.
- Alternative routes and redirections will be signed. Please drive to the conditions at all times during construction as points of access, temporary lane closures and changes to traffic flow will occur.



What to expect:

- Works in the median, footpaths and roadway adjacent to Golden Gate and along the western side of the Gold Coast Highway to Jarri Parila Cove.
- Installation of safety barriers and fencing to contain the construction area.
- Heavy machinery, such as excavation and crane movements, to facilitate construction.
- Construction will involve relocating services, above and below ground, such as gas, water and electricity, and upgrading storm water drainage.
- Works will involve underground service installations, construction of new footpaths, kerbing, and roadway.
- Pedestrian access routes will be maintained around the construction area. Temporary footpath closures near the active work area will occur and alternative routes will be signed.
- Construction noise, dust and vibration at times. Every effort will be made to minimise these impacts.
- The majority of construction work will be carried out between 6:30am and 6:30pm, Monday to Saturday.
- Timing of this work is subject to weather conditions and construction constraints.

Night works:

- Some night works may be required. Please sign up to receive project emails and advance notification of night works in the area.
- During night works vehicles will use “quacker” (quieter) reversing alarms to reduce noise.
- Light towers will be placed to limit glare to nearby residences.
