



Surfers Paradise Boulevard Closed Beach Road to Trickett Street

From Monday 17 March 2014, Surfers Paradise Boulevard will be closed to traffic from Beach Road to Trickett Street for up to two weeks to facilitate footpath construction.

Traffic changes:

- Surfers Paradise Boulevard will be closed to all southbound traffic from Beach Road and Hanlan Street to Trickett Street.
- Southbound traffic will be detoured to the Gold Coast Highway at Beach Road or the Esplanade at Hanlan Street to return to Surfers Paradise Boulevard.
- Local access for businesses and residents in Alison Street will be maintained from Surfers Paradise Boulevard southbound under traffic control during the road closure (see map).
- Local access to The Islander will be maintained from Surfers Paradise Boulevard southbound under traffic control during the road closure (see map).
- Pedestrian and business access routes will be maintained around the construction area. Temporary footpath closures near the active work area will occur and alternative routes will be signed.
- Alternative routes and redirections will be signed. Please drive to the conditions at all times during construction as points of access, temporary closures and changes to traffic flow will occur.



What to expect:

- Construction of the footpath will be undertaken in three stages:
 - Raising or lowering pit lids where required and demolition of existing footpath pavement
 - Pouring a base layer of concrete
 - Laying the final pavers
- Heavy machinery, such as jack-hammering will be used to facilitate construction.
- Installation of safety barriers and fencing to contain the construction area.
- Construction noise, vibration and dust. Every effort will be made to minimise these impacts.
- The majority of construction work will be carried out between 6:30am and 6:30pm, Monday to Saturday.
- Timing of this work is subject to weather conditions and construction constraints.

Night Works:

- Night works will be required as part of these works to minimise the impact on businesses, pedestrians and traffic.
- During night works vehicles will use “quacker” (quieter) style reversing alarms to reduce noise.
- Light towers will be placed to limit glare to nearby residences.
