### Light rail on track!

Queensland's first light rail system has reached a major milestone with 2,800 tonnes of rail track recently arriving on the Gold Coast.

The arrival of the rail and transport logistics were witnessed by the Minister for Transport and Main Roads Scott Emerson, who said this milestone reinforced the government's commitment to delivering the Gold Coast Rapid Transit project.

The rail arrived by ship at the Port of Brisbane in late April and was trucked to a secure storage site north of the Gold Coast. It took 140 semi-trailer trips to transport the rails to their destination.

Each segment of rail connecting the 13-kilometre route is 18 metres in length and were manufactured overseas due to the highly specialised expertise and equipment required.

In order to construct Stage One of the Gold Coast light rail system, 55 kilometres of rail was manufactured in Austria by Voestalpine Schienen GmbH, a global leader in the production of grooved rails.

A total of 14 light rail vehicles will operate along the route with steel wheels fitted to run along the fixed track. Track
